Top Time Wasters that Detour College Student Progress

What are your time wasters? The first three on the list can all be done just by using your phone. Do you know how much time you spend on your phone? What would you guess is the number? Check your phone's settings and look for your screen time. Was the time spent more or less than you guessed?

It is important to know that the higher the average phone screen time is, it takes away time you could be studying. For example: *An average of six (6) hours of phone time translates into four months per year of just looking at the phone!*

What can you do to decrease the number? If your screen time is high, then we suggest implementing effective time management strategies, such as identifying dedicated study time and limiting your screen time. Take regular breaks and create a technology free study zone. Set goals and boundaries. **We want you to be successful.**

Atlantic Cape Connect: Students now use Atlantic Cape Connect portal to get to your college accounts. It is based on cards, which provide information or links to other web pages including Self Service, Blackboard Learn, your schedule, and other important information. You are able to interact with these cards and click through on the cards to open the web pages. Enter your username with your Atlantic Cape Self Service username followed by student.atlanticcape.edu e.g. johnrsmith@student.atlanticcape.edu

Buccaneer Email: Your college-assigned email account. Your email login was provided in your acceptance letter from the college. If you are not sure of your email address, check your Self Service account to review your email addresses under Academic Profile>My Profile. You are always required to use your buccaneer email for registration guestions, advising, or any other requests. **Financial Aid:** FAFSA (Federal) and HESAA (State) applications must be completed once year. Financial aid is for a school year (fall/spring/summer). Once you file, wait about 7-10 days and check your *Self Service* Financial Aid Account information for required documents. Complete, hand-sign and upload these so your eligibility can be determined. Your financial aid is not complete until this is done, reviewed and posted on your account, under awards. It is the student's responsibility to confirm any aid is ready to use and applied.

Prerequisite: A course(s) students must successfully complete before being allowed to register for a more advanced course in the same or related subject area. Typically, grades of "C" or better are required to move on to other courses.

Program Requirements: Courses that form the basis for your academic major (program/degree) and are essential to completing that program for meeting license or certification requirements. These are the courses shown on Self Service when you view your Progress. Typically, students taking about 15 college credits/semester may be able to graduate in two years (not including developmental coursework). Meet with an Advisor to plan your degree straight through to graduation.

Registration: Selecting course(s) & section(s) and adding it to your schedule. This is different than pre-planning. *Registering is official & incurs tuition & fee charges &* means you have "saved" your seat in the class.

Important Reminders Regarding VA Education Benefits



A VA transmittal form must be completed for EACH semester that you wish to use VA educational benefits. All remedial classes must be taken in person. Remedial courses taken online will not be certified and must be paid out of pocket or with financial aid (if eligible). Any changes in enrollment (add, drop, withdraw) must be reported to the email below or by submitting an updated VA Transmittal form. All courses must be required in your degree program. Students must maintain satisfactory academic progress. If you fail or withdraw from too many classes your benefits may be terminated and/or you may have to do a financial aid appeal in order to regain your VA educational benefits.

Work-Study What to Know

What is Work-Study?

A federal program that provides students with an opportunity for on and off campus part-time employment, arranged around class schedules. This is designed to also provide students with real-world job skills. Employment is not guaranteed and is based on positions available and may require an interview with position supervisor.

How Do I Qualify for Work-Study?

Are you ENROLLED in at least **six credits**? Have you APPLIED for **FAFSA** (Federal Application for Financial Aid)?

Stop into a Financial Aid Office and see if you are eligible.
