

President's Corner



Summer is in full swing, and here at Atlantic Cape we are as busy as ever working to expand access to a high quality and affordable education! I am pleased to report that during the Spring

2019 semester, over 300 Atlantic Cape students received nearly \$410,000 in last-dollar financial aid through the State of New Jersey's Community College Opportunity Grant (CCOG) program. This is great news, and it is a big "win" for college affordability and for the students that may not have been able to afford to attend college without it.

Therefore, I am thrilled to share that the state budget recently signed by Governor Murphy renewed and expanded funding for CCOG for the 2019-2020 academic year! Better yet, our legislators took affordability advocates' recommendations and feedback to heart, and as a result, the household income eligibility threshold has been raised from \$45,000 adjusted gross income (AGI) up to \$65,000. The financial barrier to higher education is

now smaller than ever before.

As we prepare for the fall semester to begin, I would greatly appreciate your help in getting the word out to your communities about this amazing opportunity. I would also like to note that while removing the financial barrier of the cost of college tuition is a major victory, it is not enough. There are many costs associated with higher education that fall outside of the scope of financial aid programs such as the CCOG. For example, books and supplies, transportation, and childcare can often account for a large percentage of a student's expenses, but are not covered by most financial aid programs.

This is one of the reasons why the scholarships that the Atlantic Cape Foundation awards to our students are so critical. These scholarships are made possible by the generous donations of local business owners, philanthropists, and other friends of the college—especially alumni—and they typically have fewer restrictions than state and federal financial aid awards. As such, they play a key role in closing these gaps to expand access to higher education.

The College has also been working diligently to address these hidden costs in a variety of ways. Notably, we received a \$10,000 "Special Projects"

grant from the New Jersey Office of the Secretary of Higher Education to combat food insecurity on campus. We were able to use a portion of these funds to distribute free food to our students during Finals Week in May, and I am proud to announce that we will be using the remainder of these funds to open food pantries on all 3 Atlantic Cape campuses for the upcoming fall semester. It is our hope that these pantries will help to ensure that no student goes to class hungry.

We are currently in the process of recruiting volunteers to help staff the pantries, and we will also be soliciting donations of food and other supplies (such as toiletries and personal care items) to keep our pantries well-stocked throughout the academic year. Atlantic Cape Community College Students Receive Over \$300,000 in Scholarships

Atlantic Cape Community College awarded 245 scholarships totaling over \$300,000 at its 52nd Annual Scholarship Recognition Ceremony on May 21. This amount represents only a portion of the scholarships to be distributed throughout the year. Atlantic Cape receives generous donations and raises funds through our Foundation so that a wide range of scholarships are available for both new students and current students.

The event included scholarship recipient and donor presentations, a donor reception and the opportunity for scholarship recipients to meet their respective donors. President Dr. Barbara Gaba; Jean McAlister, Chief of Staff and Atlantic Cape Foundation Executive Director; and **Kelly McClay, '98**, Dean of the Academy of Culinary Arts greeted nearly 325 guests which included scholarship recipients and their family, faculty, staff, and members of the college board of trustees and Atlantic Cape Foundation board.



Several Atlantic Cape graduates gave remarks about their time at the college and the significance of staying connected and involved. **Christopher Mularz, '01**, Atlantic Cape Foundation board member, alumnus, adjunct professor, and scholarship donor, spoke about the importance of remaining engaged with Atlantic Cape Community College in an effort to pay it forward to current students pursuing their educational goals, in the classroom, through fundraising efforts with the Foundation, and by establishing the Victoria Evelyn Mularz Memorial Scholarship with his wife Cate in memory of their daughter. Christopher graduated from Rutgers University with a B.A. in Political Science and Master of Public Administration. Since 2007, he has worked for the Atlantic County Department of Planning & Development as a Senior Administrative Analyst.

Atlantic Cape Assistant Professor of English, **Richard Russell, Jr., '99**, spoke to the audience about his own experience with the college, starting as a child attending the daycare located in the J-Building on the Mays Landing Campus, later as a Kids College attendee, and then after high school, obtaining an A.A. in Liberal Arts and an A.S. in General Studies. He would later go on to graduate magna cum laude from New York University with a B.A. in English, from the New School University with a M.S. in Teaching, and from the University of London with a M.A. in English. Professor Russell also supports several Atlantic Cape scholarships and is the advisor for Rewrites, the literary magazine of Atlantic Cape Community College.

Nathan Evans, Jr., '15, one of the 2019 recipients of the President's Distinguished Alumni "Top Four Under 40" Award, discussed his educational journey which did not initially begin at Atlantic Cape. The Communication major emphasized the importance of staying the course, working hard, and seeking guidance from Atlantic Cape faculty and staff in order to be successful. Nathan graduated from Rowan University in May 2019 with a B.A. in Liberal Studies, works in the fitness/wellness industry and additionally holds motivational speaking engagements. The event concluded with remarks from two 2019 scholarship recipients, Jalen Hudgins (A.A. Communication) and Karen Moylen (A.A.S. Nursing).
